## Trip to the Severn Valley Railway - Sunday 25-4-82

Our forthcoming visit to Bridghorth, promises to be an interresting day out, with a variety of locos available for traffic. The fare on the coach will be EXCLUSIVE of S.V.R. tickets so that individuals can make their own minds up as to how far and how often they travel on the line. A selection of fares will be available, ranging from Eardington 3rd class return at 90p, to Bewdley 3rd class return at £3.30, with an 'all line rover' (travel up and down all day !!) at £5.30. First class fares are not a lot dearer (Bewdley £4.00, rover £6.30, etc.), and children/senior citizens/S.V.R. members are all around half price.

An intensive service will operate in both directions from 10.35 a.m. to 6.00 p.m. with trains at 45 minute intervals. At the southern end, all trains will extend to Foley Park on the specially opened Kidderminster section. It is hoped to issue details of timetables and loco diagrams on the coach enroute. There was a late departure from Warrington, and the run wasn't spectacular, arrival in Rhyl being almost thirty minutes down. The shedplate was retreived, and a swift dash made to the pub by all apart from big Alan Bennett, who went to find a 'chippy' lest he should fade away to a mere barrel (sorry Alan)! We returned to the station as a familiar warbling whistle told us our train was going to be class 40 hauled. Our evening was made complete when green-liveried 40106 came into view, and carried the 8-E shedplate to Chester. During a lengthy stop there the driver removed it, and Pat had to rescue it from his cab.

Andy left the train at Chester, and we continued to Warrington in the company of the Class 40 Preservation Society, some of whom were coming to our Open Day with their sales stand. On arrival at Bank Quay, we adjourned to the Patten Arms Hotel to discuss our evenings jaunt over a few more beers. There it was decided to do the whole thing again - only travelling to Holyhead - the following day. Timetables were scrutinised. Andy was phoned and told of our plans, and the stage was set for the 8-E shedplate's second outing in two days.


